

Minimum Syllabus Requirements

At its regular meeting held May 12, 1997, the Faculty Senate approved the following recommended Minimum Syllabus Requirements for new graduate and undergraduate courses. The recommendation came from the University Curriculum Committee and the Graduate Council and was approved by the Academic Affairs Committee of the Faculty Senate at its April 21, 1997 meeting.

- Instructor information
- Prerequisite(s)
- Course topics/calendar
- Grading
- List of assignments, tests, etc.
- No statements contrary to University rules regarding attendance, approved absences, etc.
- Textbook and/or resource materials listing

The following ADA Policy Statement (part of the Policy on Individual Disabling Conditions) was submitted to the University Curriculum Committee by the Department of Student Life. The policy statement was forwarded to the Faculty Senate for information.

The Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) is a federal antidiscrimination statute that provides comprehensive civil rights protection for persons with disabilities. Among other things, this legislation requires that all students with disabilities be guaranteed a learning environment that provides for reasonable accommodation of their disabilities.
